Rear Admiral Lee entered the Navy as a Naval Aviation Cadet on October 19, 1956. Upon completion of flight training he received his commission and wings in May 1958 at Kingsville, Texas. His first tour of duty was with Light Photographic Squadron 62. He then attended Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey, California and received a Bachelor's Degree in Political Science.

Admiral Lee was then assigned to Fighter Squadron 174 at Cecil Field, Florida. Subsequent assignments included Fighter Squadron 24 embarked in USS BON HOMME RICHARD (CV 31), where during his first combat cruise he shot down a North Vietnamese MIG-17 in May 1967; and Attack Squadron 37 embarked in USS KITTY HAWK (CV 63), which also saw duty in Vietnam. He returned to Cecil Field with Attack Squadron 174 until 1970. He was then assigned to Carrier Air Group 19 at Naval Air Station Lemoore, California and embarked in

USS ORISKANY (CV 34) as Carrier Air Wing Operations until 1971 for a third combat tour.

In 1972 Admiral Lee served with Attack Squadron 122 until his Executive Office tour with Attack Squadron 147 and follow-on Commanding Officer tour during the period 1974-75. He was Assistant Air Department Officer in USS FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT (CV 42) in 1977 during the ship's last cruise to the Mediterranean prior to decommissioning. In 1978-79 Admiral Lee was assigned as Commander Carrier Air Wing NINE at NAS Lemoore and embarked in USS CONSTELLATION (CV 64). He then commanded USS NIAGARA FALLS (AFS 3) during 1980-81. In 1982, he was assigned as Commanding Officer of USS FORRESTAL (CV 59).

During 1984-85, Admiral Lee was assigned to the Aircraft Carrier and Air Station Programs Division, Office of the Deputy Chief of Naval Operations (Air Warfare) in Washington, D.C. with a subsequent tour as Chief of Staff, Commander U.S. SIXTH Fleet during 1985-86. In October 1986, Admiral Lee was assigned as the Executive Assistant to the Commander in Chief, U.S. Atlantic Fleet where he was selected for Flag rank.

Admiral Lee's awards include the Silver Star Medal, Defense Superior Service Medal, Distinguished Flying Cross, Meritorious Service Medal, Air Medal and Navy Commendation Medal.

He is married to the former Dorothy Barlow of Pensacola, Florida. They have two sons who reside in California.

COMMANDER DELBERT OAKES, JR.

United States Navy

Commander Delbert Oakes, Jr., a native of Lenoir, NC began his Navy career in July 1955 and worked his way up the enlisted ladder, attaining the rate of Chief Aviation Ordnanceman. In 1968 he received appointment as Warrant Officer (W-1). In 1972, then CWO (W-2) Oakes applied for and was selected for the Limited Duty Officer (LDO) Program, category 636X. His appointment to "LDO" status became effective 02 October 1972 as Lieutenant (junior grade). His current rank became effective 01 December 1985.



Commander Oakes' previous (officer) assignments include USS KEARSARGE (CVS-33), Modified Advanced Undersea Weapons (MAUW) Detachment Officer at NAS Jacksonville, FL; Special Weapons Division Officer/Nuclear Safety Officer aboard USS CORAL SEA (CV-43); Avionics/Armament Officer with Air Test and Evaluation Squadron FIVE (VX-5) at NWC China Lake, CA; Ordnance/Gunnery Officer aboard USS FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT (CV-42); Weapons Department Head at NAS Key West, FL; and Electronics Warfare Officer and Assistant Officer in Charge at Pinecastle Electronic Warfare Range, Astor, FL; Officer in Charge, Mobile Missile Maintenance Unit ONE (MMMU-1); Weapons Officer, NWC China Lake, CA; Head, Explosives and Weapons System Safety Division, Naval Safety Center, Norfolk, VA; Weapons Officer, NAS Norfolk, VA and Officer in Charge, Missile Maintenance Unit ONE (MMU-1). Previous (enlisted) assignments include tours of duty with NTC Great Lakes, IL (boot camp), Fleet Air Gunnery Unit Pacific (FAGUPAC) NAS El Centro, CA; Patrol Squadron FOUR SIX (VP-46); NAS Alameda, CA; USS ORISKANY (CVA-34) and USS KEARSARGE (CVS-33).

Commander Oakes, his wife LCDR Deborah Lynn (Harlow) Oakes and children reside in quarters in West Kalayaan, Naval Station Subic RP.

COMMAND HISTORY OF NAVAL AIRBORNE WEAPONS MAINTENANCE UNIT ONE

Naval Airborne Weapons Maintenance Unit ONE was originally established as Mobile Missile Maintenance Unit ONE in 1968 as a department of NAS Cubi Point, Republic of the Philippines. On 19 January 1972, the Unit became a separate activity of Commander Naval Air Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet, and an administrative component of Naval Air Station, Cubi Point, under the operational control of U.S. Naval Magazine, Subic Bay. On 30 June 1975, operational and administrative control was transferred to Commander, Fleet Air Western Pacific. The unit mission was to maintain the capability to deploy on limited notice with necessary personnel and equipment to support forward area air launched weapons maintenance requirements. In March 1985 the Unit was redesignated as Missile Maintenance Unit ONE. The Unit was no longer required to maintain a deployable status. On 30 September 1988 the Unit disestablished and reestablished as Naval Airborne Weapons Maintenance Unit ONE (NAWMU-1), an operational Unit under a Commanding Officer. Today's mission has changed very little. The Unit retains the capability to test and perform intermediate level maintenance on selected air and surface launched missiles and guided weapons.

The Unit is funded by COMNAVAIRSYSCOM and is similar to Naval Weapons Stations in the United States. A considerable savings of funds are realized by NAWMU-1's maintenance capabilities. Foremost, NAWMU-1's abilities to perform intermediate level maintenance are realized in munitions asset availability in the Western Pacific to support deployed units of the United States Seventh Fleet and Fleet Marine Forces, Pacific Fleet.
