




I wanted to take the time on this email to thank all of the Marines that we've been working with. Their enthusiasm and professionalism was second to none. Best of luck during your upcoming OT-1 event! As a result of the Marine feedback, the Manual Drive Assembly (MDA) has a few additions including: a test fixture to make it easy for the "O" level to perform their pre-use inspection to verify operation of both the torque-limiter clutch and the "noback clutch", a positive lock on the MDA latches, two short wobble extensions, and P/Ns for each individual item. Our Mechanical Lab made up a positive lock and a test fixture, added the 3" extensions with wobble, etched P/N's on each item, and updated the inventory card to support the remainder of the test program (final production versions may differ after the design engineers work on the best way to accomplish the tasks). The MDA case currently weighs 40 lbs. The Marines have strongly requested that room in the case be made for two SE Hoists so that everything is in one case and the design engineers are working on making that happen prior to production.

Lastly I've copied Kevin Meagher who is the editor for the Red Shirt with a photo of the Marines from VMFAT-501, VMFA-121, and VMX-22 that were the first to use the MDA on a USMC F-35B aircraft in the hopes that he can put the photo in one of the upcoming issues.


James D. Deal Assistant Federal Security Director for Law Enforcement Reno-Tahoe International Airport






In his recommendation to the Navy League, NATTC Commanding Officer Capt. Alan Dean commended Williams for her leadership inside the command and also in the community.





SYMBOLISM



SHIELD: Dark blue and gold are the colors of the United States Navy. The shield's elements are counterchanged to keep them dom nant. The seven aerial bombs represent the date of the attack on Pearl Harbor (December 7, 1941). The three black chevronelles alluated by John Finn's Navy Chief Petty Officer rank, and the color black recalls that he was the last living Medal of Honor recipient from the Pearl Harbor attack. The trident represents naval authority, and the three spikes stand for the ship's multi-mission capability. The blue barbed shannock against the yellow field represents John Finn's naval career and his lineage as a tough American-Irishman when the embodied the motto, "Status Et Pugno" (Stand Fast and Fight).

<u>CREST</u>: The anchor, the color and stars on the winged bomb, and the superimposed star on the bomb are elements representing the Navy Medal of Honor. (As a Chief Petty Officer, John Finn received this award at the start of WWII.) The winged bomb symbolization of Finn's rating of chief aviation ordnance man stationed at Naval Air Station Kaneohe Bay. The 50-caliber rounds recall his man

ning a machine gun from an exposed position throughout the attack on 7 December 1941. The winged bomb also represents that DDG 113 is the first ship but with the Aegis Baseline 9 Weapon System that allows simultaneous air warfare and ballistic missile defense capability. The twelve shamrocks recall CPO Finn Irish heritage and the numerous times he was hit by enemy fire.

<u>SUPPORTERS</u>: The crossed Navy officer's sword and Navy cutlass reflect the fact that John Finn was both an enlisted sailor and an officer in the Navy, and the also represent the teamwork and cooperation of the officer-enlisted crew of DDG 113.

SEAL: The coat of arms as blazoned in full color on a white oblong disc within a dark blue designation band, edged with a gold rope border and bearing the nan "USS JOHN FINN" at the top and "DDG 113" at the base.




